This historic brick electric substation building was converted into the home of Digital Design Village in the autumn of 2010, taking advantage of the rapidly growing Michigan film industry's tax credits. Digital Design Village was intended as a post-production studio, to employ a core staff of digital and special effects producers, and to collaborate with local businesses, universities, and colleges to develop a local work force and infrastructure to meet the creative standards set by the motion picture industry.
