State & Washington S.E. The T. Stewart White house stood at the point on the southeast corner of Washington and State. It was demolished in 1918.

The bust of Abraham Lincoln which faces east in the triangle formed by Washington and State Streets rests on a stone pedestal noting that it was given by Loraine Pratt Immen in 1913.

235 State S.E. The Calkins Law Office was built in 1836, and originally stood on the northeast corner of Monroe and Ionia. It was later moved to 1114 Ionia N.W., and used for many years as a residence. Having fallen into complete disrepair, it was rescued and moved by the Grand Rapids Public Museum to its present site. The simple frame building is the oldest building in Grand Rapids.
